THE FORMATIVE YEARS

Before 1957

Although piping in the North Berwick area was probably in effect from an earlier date it can be traced back to 1740. Records show that a Burgh Piper was employed at a salary of £5 Scots to play through the town to waken townspeople first thing in the morning and again at curfew in the evening. The last recorded appearance of the Burgh Piper in North Berwick was in 1744, just before the banning of kilts and bagpipes following the defeat of Bonnie Prince Charlie at Culloden. The tradition was revived in 1979 when members of North Berwick Pipe Band played at the curfew hour of 8:00 p.m. on the harbour wall on Mondays, Fridays and Saturdays during July and August. This continued for a period of three years.



It is perhaps a little surprising that North Berwick, situated at a distance from the centres of piping activity, can maintain an enthusiastic and

active Pipe Band. While bagpipes have been with us for more than 2,000 years, it was only during Queen Victoria's reign that the pipes and drums joined forces to become one unit. It was in 1854 that authority was granted for the first time for the official employment of pipers in the army. There had been regimental drummers for a significant period prior to this, the drum being used to send signals over the battlefield. It is reported that it was at the battle of Waterloo, upon hearing the bagpipes of an approaching highland regiment, drummers of the Cheshire Regiment started to tap out the beat of the march. If this report is to be believed, then it was at this juncture that the modern pipe band has its foundation.

The Govan Burgh Police established the world's first civilian pipe band in 1880. Although no detailed record of the formation of the original North Berwick Pipe Band has been found, it should be pointed out that it was one of the earliest civilian bands to be formed in the country. It is rumoured that the band was formed in 1884 when local apprentices played together.

It is generally held that the band formally came together in 1899. To celebrate the recapture of Pretoria during the Boer war a parade was held on 7th June 1900 at four o'clock and a band of musicians (pipe band?) lead the procession, followed by

Provost John MacIntyre. John MacIntyre was Provost of North Berwick from 1899 to 1919 and he is reputed to be a founder member of the Pipe Band.

A quote from the Haddingtonshire Courier of 1 February 1901 refers to "*The recently formed pipe band made a very creditable initial public appearance in connection with the royal proclamation on Monday.*" This would refer to the Royal accession of King Edward VII on 29 January 1901.

A further article in the Courier of 1 March 1901 reports on a Concert and presentations given by the "*recently inaugurated North Berwick Pipe Band*" in honour of, amongst other things, of Privates Charles Thorburn and William Hutchison of the Royal Scots Service Company, on their being about to depart for the front (Transvaal)".

Also contained in the article were references to "*In the early spring there were decided expressions on the part of several members of the community in favour of a band*". Plus "*The band was subsequently formed and their enthusiastic bandmaster, Mr. W Hume, deserved the utmost credit for the way in which he has brought forward these young lads, of whose extraordinary progress in such a short time ample proof would be given that night*".

From these quotations it would appear to confirm that the Band had indeed probably come together during 1899 and was officially inaugurated in Summer/Autumn of 1900.

The following picture illustrates the Band with Band founder Alexander Campbell Hutchison.

The Pipe-Major was William Hume and the instruments and highland dress cost £121, raised by public subscription.

Some illustrations of this early Band:



In August 1902, the Pipe Band headed a procession from the railway station to the cross in Quality Street to welcome back two heroes of the Boer War. The whole town turned out to greet the gallant troopers James Kendall and Walter Gilholm of the Scottish Horse on their safe return.

Despite the lack of official documentation, the North Berwick band certainly took part in local parades for the relief of Mafeking.

In August 1902, they participated in the coronation celebrations of King Edward VII who was to visit the town in October of that year.

welcome and participation in the visit.

The nature of the King's visit was to convalesce from appendicitis and, while in North Berwick, three members of the original band were invited to play for him. Pipe Major William Hume and pipers Dave Slicer and Alex Laing performed before His Majesty at the house known as The Knoll, later to be renamed King's Knoll.

A quote from the Haddingtonshire Courier of 17 October 1902 gives further credence to this tale.

"The North Berwick Pipe Band, which was formed some two years since... On the occasion of the King's visit the band was very highly honoured indeed by his Majesty and the bandsmen are naturally extremely proud of the distinction accorded them. Under their most efficient conductor Pipe Major William Hume, the band played round the table on both nights in full Highland costume, while the King was at dinner, and His Majesty was highly pleased with their performance. On the second night of the King's visit the pipers after having given a selection on the lawn at The Knoll, again had the honour of playing round the table while His Majesty dined, and they were honoured with what was regarded as an encore, as they were subsequently recalled and requested to perform in the front hall. Prior to leaving The Knoll the band struck up the National Anthem, and it was

noticed that the King's party rose to their feet the while".

Further evidence was given by one of North Berwick's oldest residents, Mr William Laing, of Lochbridge Road, who remembers when two local soldiers returned home. Mr Laing, a retired master painter, recalls: "The first thing I remember about the Band was back in 1903 at the time of the Boer War. The Band met Jim Herries and Alex McLaren at the west end of Dirleton Avenue and played them home."

The Presidential Jewel that the Band currently uses was originally presented by Provost John MacIntyre as a medal for "Yearly Competition".



The pipes that Pipe Major Hume played remained in his family for a number of years until they were given to the present band. The pipes are still in use today. Pipe Major Hume was a well-known baker in the town and, together with President Andrew Aitken Senior, who ran a sweet shop, the Band continued playing at sports days and lifeboat processions until the Great War.

It was not until 14 years after the end of that war that the second generation of North Berwick Pipe Band emerged. It was about 1932 that the

local Scout Troop, under Scout Master Rupert Chalmers-Watson, formed a pipe band for the forthcoming International Jamboree in Denmark. Members of the scout band included Bill Seaton, vice-president of the band in the early 1980's, and his brother Andrew who played as a piper from 1932 until 1981. The family connection has continued with the band through Bill's grandson Bruce Seaton who joined the band in 1981 and was tutored by his great uncle Andrew. Bruce left the Band around 1986.

The pipe tutor in 1932 was Captain J. B. Whitelaw of Nungate, North Berwick. A keen piper, he instructed the Rover Scouts for their trip to Denmark. The youngsters practised on chanter's then graduated onto full pipes. But a scarlet fever scare almost scuppered the band's hopes of representing their country at the World Jamboree. Seven scouts played in turn one set of bagpipes only for one of them to be admitted to hospital the following day with scarlet fever. Fortunately, none of the others contracted the illness and the band and troop successfully represented Scotland at Copenhagen in 1935.

The Scout Band continued to take part in local parades, including the King's Silver Jubilee in 1935



and the Coronation Parade in 1937, until the outbreak of World War Two.

Although the band as such disbanded piping and drumming tuition continued.

Tom Fergusson, a stalwart of the Band for many years, was involved with the Scout "Band" in 1941.

Tom was a founder member of the current incarnation of North Berwick Pipe Band in 1957 although he had been involved with the North Berwick Scout Pipe Band from around 1941 (aged 8). Tom continued to serve and support the Band as a piper, Pipe Sergeant, Pipe Major (1972-1980), a tutor, President (2005-2012) and a general supporter and helper. In recognition of his continuing involvement with the Band, Tom was made Honorary Life President in his passing in May 2021.

The opportunity of attending another World Scout Jamboree at Fredericia, Denmark, in 1950 saw the reformation of the scout band in the Mid 1940's.

The Danes gave an enthusiastic welcome to the pipes and drums. This Scout Band continued until about 1954.

Here are a few other images of the band around that time.

One of the last appearances of this Scout Band was in the Coronation Parade in 1953.



It is rumoured that Lyle Crawford was a young Scout in this Parade. In actual fact Lyle didn't join the band until 1961 but... the child to the right of the band marching up Abbey Road is Lyle. Lyle, a piper, has also served as secretary, tour organiser, President, and many other roles over his many years with the Band.

THE FOUNDING AND THE EARLY YEARS

It was in 1957 that the present North Berwick Pipe Band was formed, as an independent unit, from the remnants of the old Rover Scout band. This was done in order to lead the parade of North Berwick Scouts celebrating the centenary of Scouts' founder Robert Baden-Powell and the 50th anniversary of the Boy Scout movement.

In honour of their scout background and as it was the centenary of the birth of Lord Baden-Powell, the new Band was styled "North Berwick B-P Pipe Band". The name was adopted at the suggestion of Rupert Chalmers-Watson and George Gray of Smeaton, both long serving scout officers who took an active interest in the newly formed band. The majority of the members were ex-members of the Scout Band and the troop donated all their equipment to the new Band. At that time the scout kilts were mainly of the Government tartan (Black Watch) and some members wore their own kilts when their sizes were not available.

A donation from Red Hackle whisky allowed the band to adopt the McKenzie (Seaforth) tartan as the standard tartan for the Band and has remained so ever since.

A couple of photos of the band at that time.



The "Seaforth" part of the tartan name comes from the fact that the pleating of the kilts is in the same style as that worn by the Seaforth Highlanders.



This was also appropriate as one of the founders of this generation of the Band was Captain Donald Ross MacLennan, one time Pipe Major of the 3rd Battalion of the Seaforth Highlanders, and winner of the Gold Medals for piping at Oban and Inverness in 1956. The Band also wear the MacLennan kilt pin to commemorate the tutelage given by "DR".



The cap badge worn by the band at that time was the Caber Feidh, also a connection to the Seaforth highlanders.



The honorary president was Sir Hew Hamilton-Dalrymple of Leuchie, North Berwick. Provost James Wishart was the first president. He contributed a great deal to the early development of the band until pressure of council work forced him to retire from the band after ten years.

New recruits for the band came from outwith the scout movement and one of the first was Peter Craig, tenor and bass drummer, who fulfilled that role until his death in 1997. At one time, Peter, his two sons, his son-in-law and his grandson all played in the same band.

In 1967 North Berwick Pipe band was still being reported as East Lothian's only Pipe Band.

Under the leadership of Pipe Major Tony Patzchky, a former member of the Scout band, North Berwick B-P Pipe Band first entered competitions in 1966 in the Grade IV division. During the next six years the band took part regularly in competitions organised by the Scottish Pipe Band Association. The band won several prizes in Grade IV competitions, until in 1970 the Band gained 1st prize in the Scottish Championship (Grade IV), 1st prize in the Lothian and Borders Championship, 2nd prize in the British Championship and 3rd prize in the Commonwealth Championship at the newly opened Meadowbank Stadium.



These successes resulted in the Band being promoted to Grade III.



Having started on the competition circuit the natural progression was for the Pipe Band, together with non-playing members on its committees, to institute a contest in North Berwick.



This Contest was to run most successfully for eight years under the chairmanship of town councillor George Darling, with Sir Hew Hamilton-Dalrymple as Chieftain. The contest started with an entry of 24 Bands in 1967 and, by its final year in 1974 had reached an entry of 54 bands. The grand parade through the town was a marvellous spectacle. This contest was somewhat unique in that it was organised totally by a competing Pipe Band. The

North Berwick contest was responsible for a number of innovations in the pipe band world, including the fostering of medley selections that gradually replaced the previous March, Strathspey and Reel programme. Another innovation which proved most popular and resulted in lasting friendships was the Scotland v's Ireland international drum major's competition for the Aer Lingus Trophy.

The current North Berwick contest that started in 1996 is actually organised by the North Berwick Highland Games Association. Although there are four members of North Berwick Pipe Band on the Committee this Association is totally independent and has no link with the Pipe Band.

In 1969 the Band had the opportunity to host the French Bagad de Vannes Melinerion from Bretagne. Unfortunately plans for the Band to visit Vannes the following year did not come to pass. By sheer coincidence Lyle Crawford received an email in 2017 from one of those original French bandsmen trying to renew the contact.

The year 1972 saw the fruition of several other Tony Patzchky ideas. First was the purchase of a new, full dress, pipe band uniform – substantially paid for by two local benefactors. When funds were exhausted, with feather bonnets still to buy, the Band members decided to buy their own, and thus the

uniform was completed. The total value of the uniforms and equipment, at that time, was in excess of £4,000.

The Band was delighted to receive the Grade III trophy for Marching and Discipline at the 1972 World Championship at Hawick. Winners in Grades I and II were Edinburgh City Police and the 2nd Battalion Scots Guards respectively.

Another of Tony's ideas was the formation of a juvenile band.



Around this time Tony stepped down and Tom Fergusson took over as Pipe Major. William Adams continued as Drum Major.

In 1973, George Darling, who became pipe band president in 1967, as well as chairman of the contest committee, was made honorary vice-president of the Northern Ireland Branch of the Scottish Pipe Band Association. This year was also the president's 70th birthday and this was celebrated with a "This is Your Life" tribute paid to him by the band together with invited guests from Scotland and Northern Ireland.

In 1974 the Band was given permission by the Town Council to wear the Burgh Coat-of-Arms. This shows a ferryboat, representing the principal activity of the town in the Middle Ages, when Christian pilgrims sailed from North Berwick to Earlsferry in

Fife on their way to worship the relics at St. Andrews.



The badges were presented by the then Provost John B Macnair at a ceremony in North Berwick in May 1974. The cap badges were worn for the first time at the North Berwick Contest that same day.

Throughout the town there a few commemorative benches that have links to the band.

The first was in memory of George Darling's wife Helen. Unfortunately this bench is no longer in place but we do still have the plaque that was attached to it.



Throughout the 1970's the Band continued to provide entertainment in the summer months for visitors and local supporters. These events were held on Sunday afternoons in the Lodge Grounds. In following years these performances were augmented by visiting bands from the south of Scotland.

The 1973 calendar for example comprised all the usual contests, gala days and parades. There were also visits from overseas bands that featured in the summer programme and this fostered much friendship and international goodwill. The Band appeared on BBC's "It's a Knockout", and played to welcome US oil executives on behalf of the Scottish Tourist Board. The Band regularly played at local hotels for visitors and conferences. The Band were pleased to give their services for local organisations and charities, but as they were (and still are) totally independent and without sponsorship they also played in North Berwick during the summer months to collect for their funds.

There have also been a few tunes written that have links to the band. In 1978 the 6:8 March 'Passing the Bass' was written and played by the band at that time.

By 1980 another generation of youngsters were ready to join the playing members and they helped to welcome guests to the Community Council's party to celebrate the Queen Mother's 80th birthday.

Of course with the introduction of so many new youngsters into the band the uniform reverted back to the No. 2 style. One feather bonnet seems to be all that remains of the original set of No 1's that the band used to wear.

The Band celebrated its Silver Jubilee in 1982 with a formal dinner at the Marine Hotel. To commemorate this anniversary, Webster Craig, one of the pipers composed the following tune.



The band continued to play in the Lodge Grounds on Sunday afternoons during the summer.



The 'Tartan Fair' was an annual fundraising event that also took place during the summer. Organised and manned by band members and supporters.



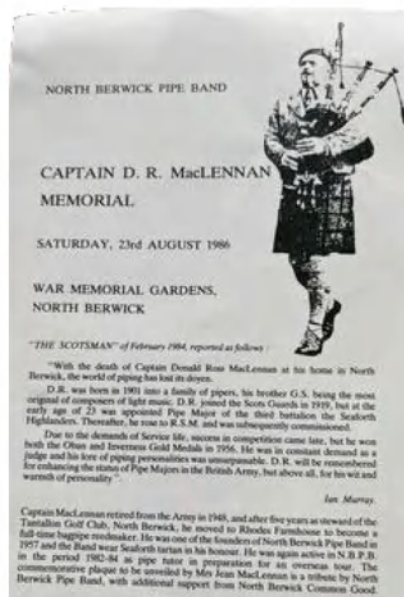

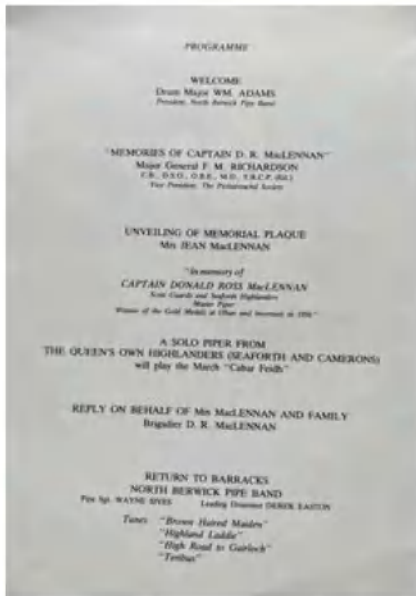
When the Band started wearing the Full Dress No 1 uniform back in the 1970's it also added the Drum Major's Baldric. As can be seen in the photograph above this is being worn by Willie Adams as the Band paraded the

Street at the Cowal Gathering in 1983 (it can also be seen in the earlier photograph of the Band at Dirleton Castle in 1972). In the image below you can see the baldric with the tags highlighting the various foreign tours the band has made.



1984 saw the passing of DR MacLennan who had been a tutor and Pipe Major of the Band at various times. The Band were proud to organise a ceremony and plaque to commemorate "DR". The ceremony was held in the War Memorial Garden with a programme of events.

THE USA AND THE MIDDLE YEARS

Following the Band's 25th Anniversary in 1982, and to boost enthusiasm within the Band, Willie Adams, then President of the Band, proposed a tour to the USA to visit the town's namesake – North Berwick, Maine.

This was probably one of the last events held in the Pavilion before it fell into disuse and was eventually demolished in 1997 to make way for the new Scottish Seabird Centre.

This trip took place in 1984 and covered Boston and North Andover in Massachusetts and North Berwick, Camden, Standish and Biddeford in Maine.

We even made the cover of one of the R.S.P.B.A.'s Pipe Band Magazines that year. The cover picture showed Drum Major Willie Adams and Piper Lyle Crawford by the water pump at Kingston Farm where we held our Sunday afternoon rehearsals.

In 1991 the Band had the opportunity to have a pipe banner made. The banner was hand-made by local resident Mrs Vida Grierson and to commemorate this, then piping tutor, Pipe Major Harry McNulty composed a 6:8 march named after Mrs Grierson.



1991 was also the year that we had a reciprocal visit from the Fanfare Concert Band from Maine, USA.

North Berwick Pipe Band were proud to have taken part in this first event in Edinburgh.

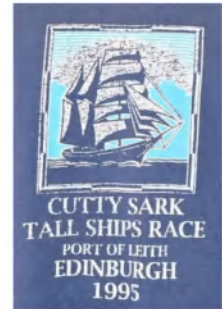

THE MILLENNIUM AND ONWARDS

2002 - 42nd Street - New York, USA. It was here, while taking part in Pipefest, that Lyle Crawford met Pat Murphy, Pipe Major of the De la Salle Scout Pipe Band from Waterford in Ireland. This was the start of a link that has seen visits both ways between North Berwick and Waterford that continue to this day.

In 2003 a contingent from the band represented East Lothian at the Folklore Festival in Cottbus, Germany. This was part of a district wide twinning between East Lothian and Landkreis Spree-Neiße in the Brandenburg area of Germany.



In association with the Dunedin Dance Academy the Band continues to represent East Lothian and Scotland at this Festival and to date have only missed one year.



In 2006, with the upcoming Centenary of the Scout movement, the Band formed links with the De la Salle Scout pipe band from Waterford, Eire.

With this as a nucleus the Scout Centenary Pipe Band was formed, performing at various Scout events during the 2007 Centenary year.



This band also included former Scouts, and representatives from Scout troops and Associations from all over Scotland.

The Leading Drummer at this time, Derek Easton, even played in the Boys' Brigade Centenary Pipe Band back in 1983.

a Garden Party at Holyrood House and in 2010 the St. Ninians Festival when Pope Benedict visited Edinburgh.



By coincidence 2007 was also the Golden Anniversary of the Band and there is a commemorative bench in the town to mark this occasion.

Even after 2007 the Scout Centenary Pipe Band continued to play at various Scout events and to represent the Scout movement at other occasions

the formation of a Junior Band within the auspices of the main Band. This junior band started by playing at local Homes for the Elderly and by 2008 was starting to take part in competitions.

2009 saw the junior band merge in with the Adult band but in 2013 it reformed again under former North Berwick Pipe Band Pipe Major Gavin Black. With Gavin's son playing in the junior band and his father-in-law in the adult band there are three generations of this family playing with the band.

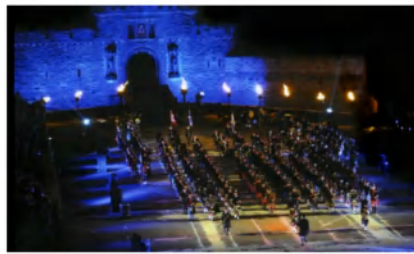
With an encouraging number of youngsters learning pipes and drums, 2006/2007 saw



And to finish off 2009 it was also the year of the Homecoming event at which the band, in the company of the majority of the other East Lothian bands, played in Haddington, Tranent, North Berwick and finally Athelstaneford, the home of the Saltire, on the one weekend.



There was also a parade in Edinburgh, following which some members were able to take part in a performance on the Esplanade.



To celebrate this weekend the Council presented pipe banners to all the other participating bands. This gave us our 2nd banner, which is paraded by the Pipe Sergeant.



2010 and we were playing in the Great Hall in Edinburgh Castle for the 20th Anniversary of the German re-unification.



While in 2011 we entertained the crowd "down the street" after the North Berwick Highland Games.



2011 was also the year of expansion of our foreign tours. In that year we set off for northern Portugal to take part in the Festival de Folclore Internacional Alto Minho in Viana do Castelo. A week in early September performing at various local venues and concerts in the evenings. Even producing a traditional Scottish meal – haggis and cranachan – for our hosts.

This design was selected to simplify printing and reduce costs and uses the Bass Rock that is synonymous with North Berwick.

2017 was also the 60th Anniversary of the band and to celebrate a formal dinner was held in Edinburgh Castle for members, former members, supporters and invited guests.



On Sunday 11 November 2018, at 6.00am, the Band had several pipers taking part in the "Battle's O'er" commemorative event at War memorials in and around North Berwick.

COVID AND RESTARTING BAND LIFE

2020 was the year of the worldwide Covid-19 pandemic. This changed a lot of what we did and how we did it. Virtual lessons on Skype and Zoom. Meeting outside in fields for socially distanced drum or pipe practice. When we were able to get back to one-to-one tutoring, with the help of the Coop Community Fund, we were able to purchase electronic chanters, which made things a lot easier when playing with face masks.

Most of the year's engagements were cancelled but we still managed small performances at local care homes.



Praising the front line workers as well as celebrating the peace anniversaries of VE75 and VJ75 was also possible by individuals and duets and the occasional trio and quartet.

Sadly, in May of 2021, Tom Fergusson, former Pipe Major, President, Tutor and Hon. Life President passed away. Fortunately, relaxations in the restrictions allowed some members of the band to lead the hearse into the cemetery for an appropriate farewell.

Although the pandemic continued, the work of the band also continued. Every relaxation in guidance allowed us opportunities to get together and play and to continue the Band's work. Even the band related compositions continued. In this case as a thank you for his tuition one of the parent's had Gordon Shand (no relation to Jimmy) dedicate one of his Reels to the Leading Drummer at the time.

A commemorative parade/performance was held on the evening of what would have been the Games Day.

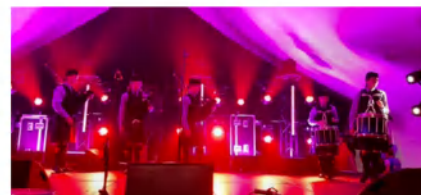


John's son, Paul led the band and we were joined by Haddington Pipe Band.

And we were able to hold Sounds of Scotland – Encore, highlighting some of our younger players.



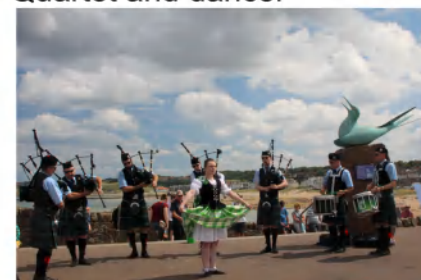
